# Bridget Jiang—Class of 2020





Recent St. Mel's Catholic Academy Alumna, and current senior at Archbishop Molloy HS, Bridget Jiang ('20) was recently invited to participate in a conference in Oxford, England as a result of the essay she submitted for the John Locke Institute annual essay competition. As an avid writer, beginning during her time at St. Mel's, Bridget wrote her essay to respond to the theology prompt: If you cannot persuade your intelligent, sympathetic friends to embrace your religious belief system, do you have enough reason to believe that you believe?. Within her essay, she argued that "The validity of one's own religious beliefs rests on internal coherence and personal conviction". During her time at Oxford, Bridget had the opportunity to attend academic conferences on philosophy and theology, and to debate students from around the world. It is clear that Bridget not only possess strong writing and persuasive skills, but she is also a young woman grounded in her faith. Bridget credits the contest for strengthening her persuasive writing skills and helping to prepare her for the writing she will be doing in college. After graduation, Bridget hopes to continue her education at Columbia University.
